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## OA CAN AFFECT YOUR DOG PHYSICALLY AND EMOTIONALLY.

Osteoarthritis can affect dogs of all ages, breeds and sizes. If left untreated, the pain can become worse over time. And, just like in humans, pain can negatively impact dogs both physically and emotionally. But your love, combined with your veterinarian's expertise, can help manage this pain. In a recent study, dogs showed significant improvement

in both their emotional and physical well-being with their pain under control.<sup>1</sup>
