
Canine Body Map

Use this map to help record and monitor lumps, bumps and changes on your dog's body.







How to check your dog for skin cancer at home.

- Slowly examine your dog from nose to tail and top to bottom to help find skin tumors.
- Always start in the same place.
- With your fingertips, feel around the muzzle, the eyes, then along the ears and the neck.
- If your dog allows you to do so safely, check for lumps and bumps in and around the mouth and muzzle.
- Stay consistent and work down each side. Have them stand up so that you can check the inside and outside of the legs.
- Check between their toes, paw pads, and don't forget the tail.
- Take note of the size and location of any lumps and bumps you find; your veterinarian will want to see them and will make recommendations based upon their findings. You can use this body map to record your findings.
- REMEMBER: catching skin cancer early is always best.

Choose a consistent day of the week to check your dog.

Snuggle Sundays can help make it easy to check your dog for skin cancer at home. Examining your dog is like giving them a massage, which can relax them and make them look forward to being checked.
